

Some of our Year 5 and 6 recommended books have a mature theme, please ensure you have read through content and context with your child, prior to reading.

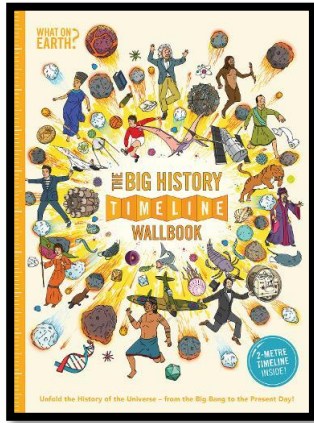
